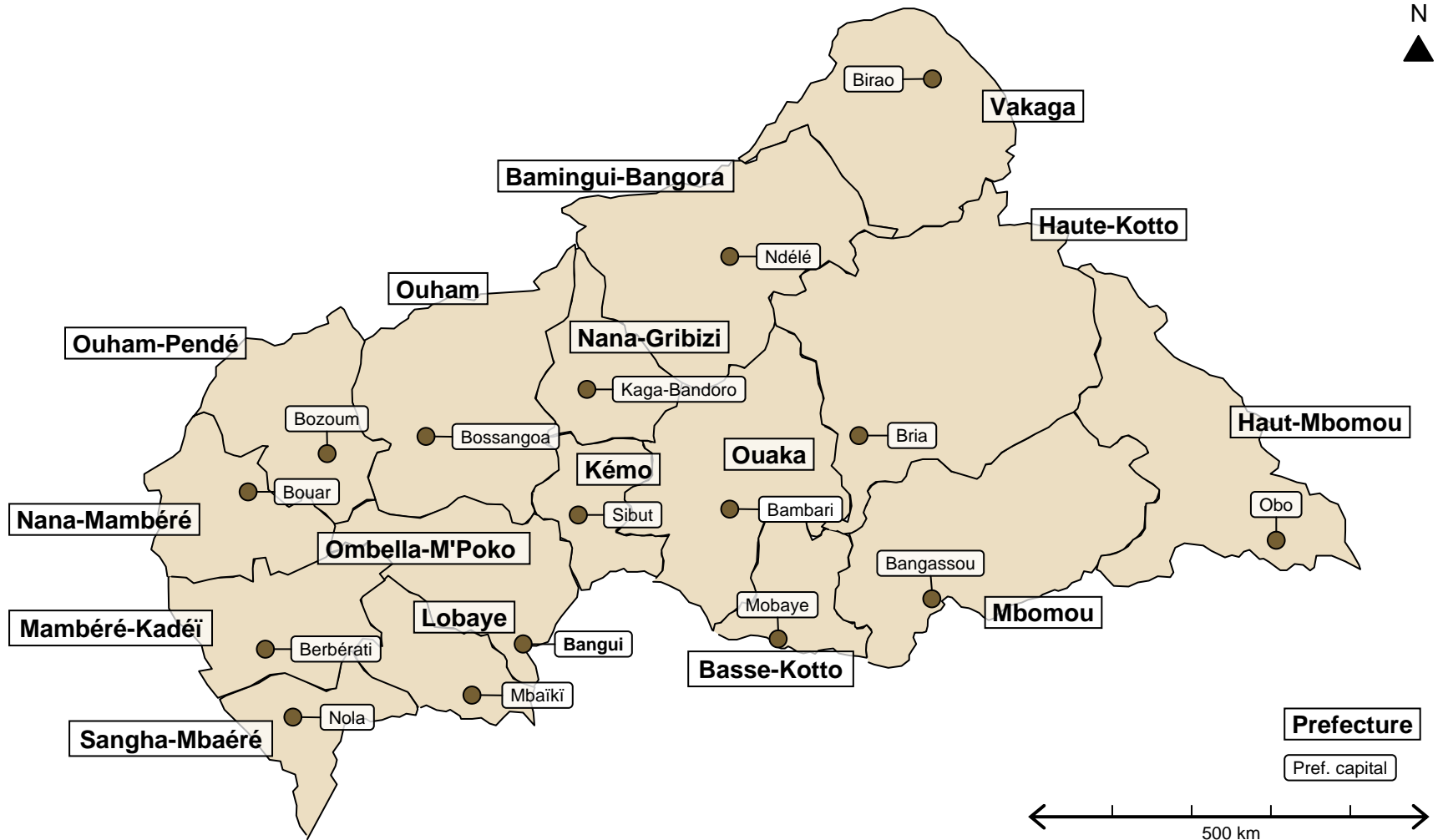

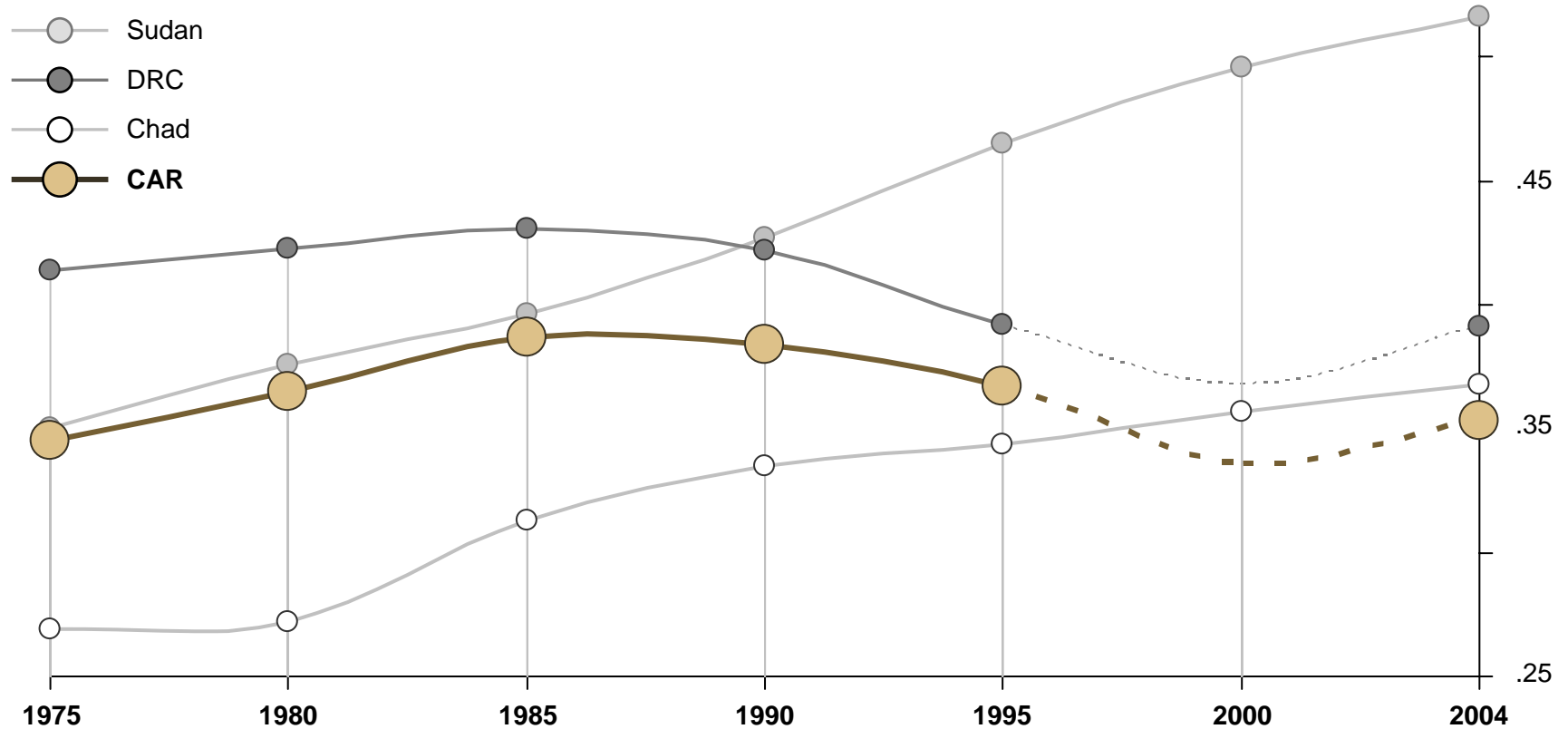


CAR prefectures and major cities



More than 20 years of under-development

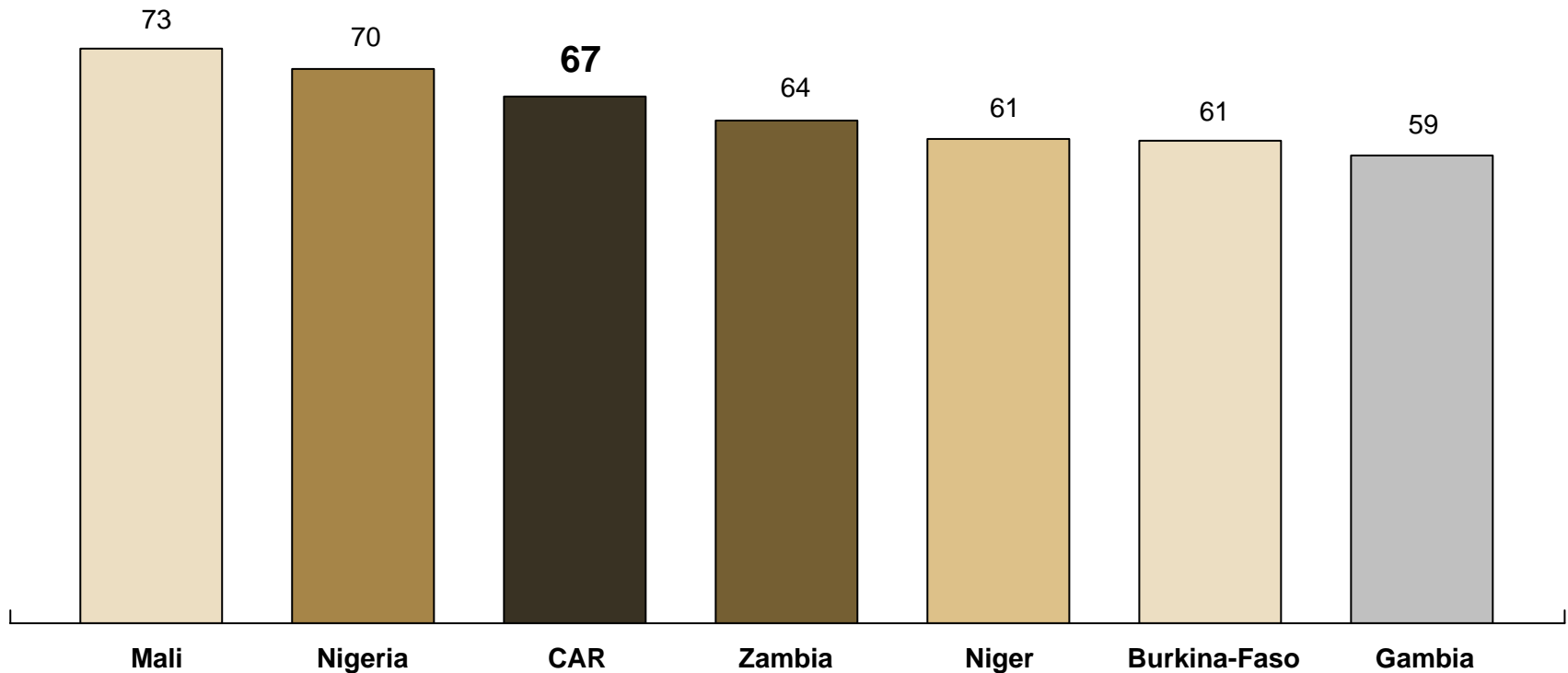
CAR's Human Development Index value fell from 0.387 in 1985 to 0.353 in 2004

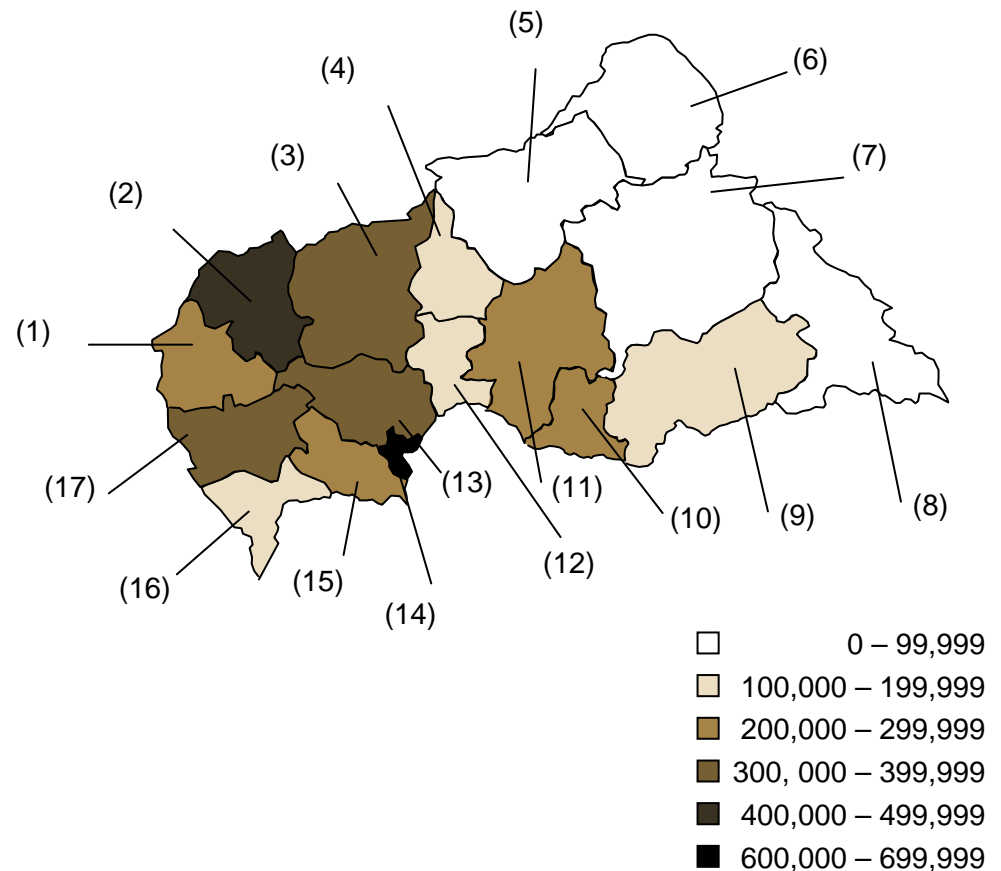

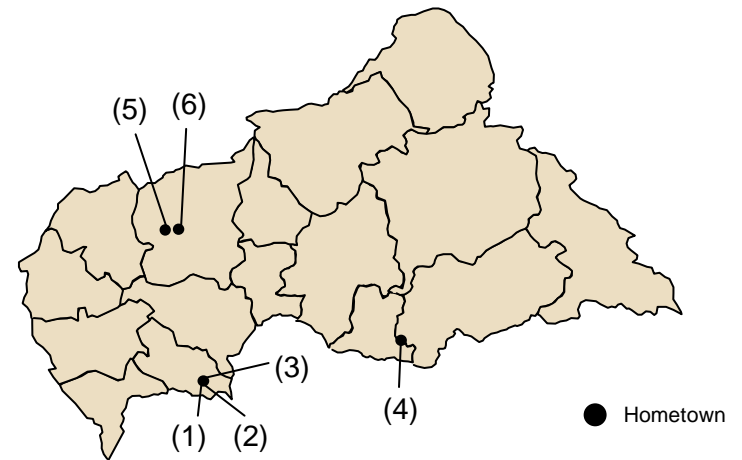

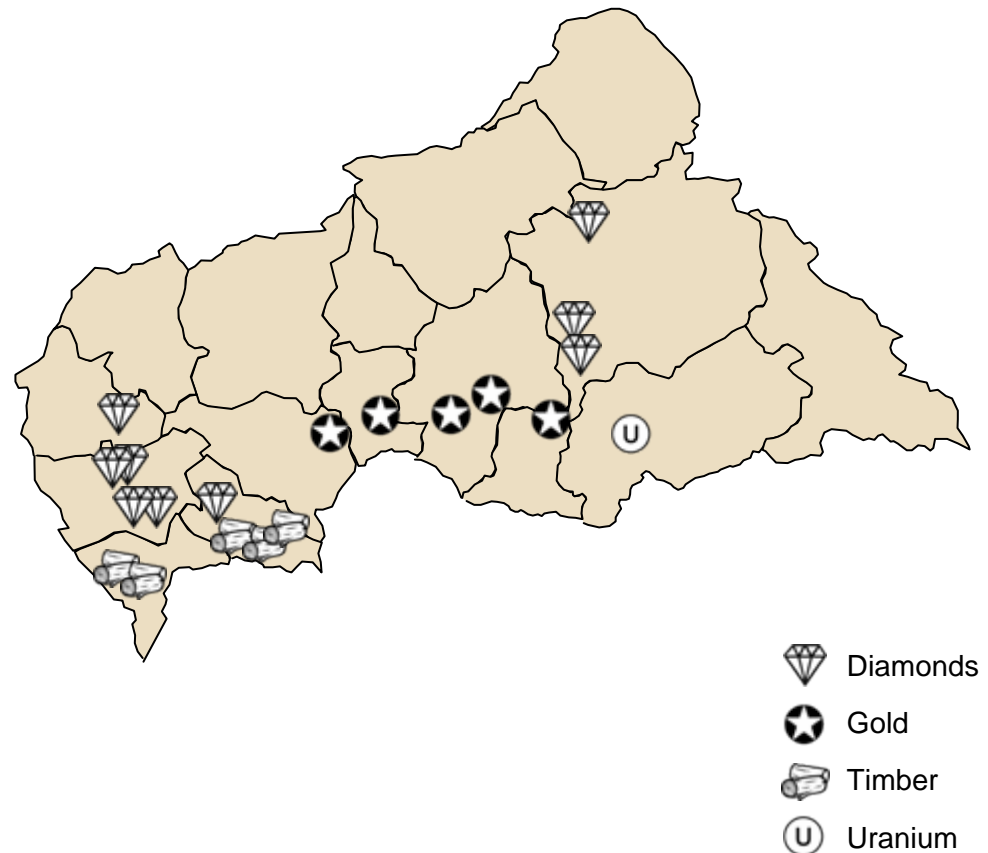

Natural resources and investments in the mining sector

Natural resources are main asset

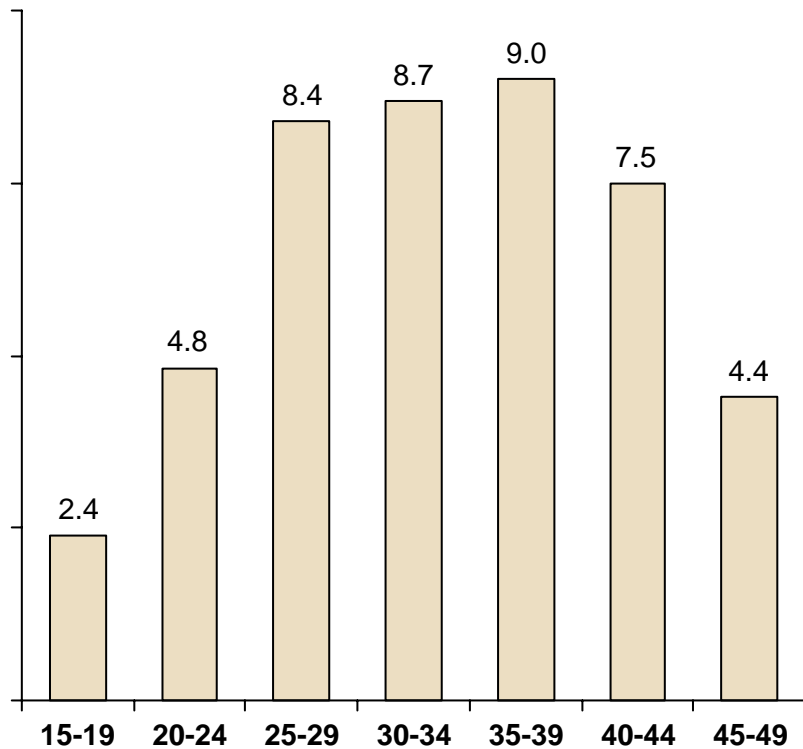
- Despite richness in natural resources, exploration efforts so far still limited
- Foreign investors recently announced investment of USD 200 million in uranium mining in 2007
- Gold production likely to surpass 7 tonnes in 2007, due to new foreign investment
- However, recent insecurity endangers economic recovery and discourages further, much needed investment

Location of selected natural resources in CAR



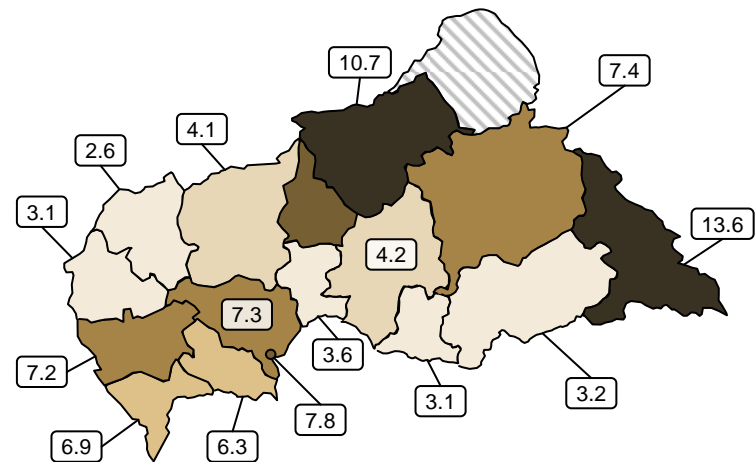
HIV/AIDS prevalence one of the highest in Africa

HIV prevalence by age group in % (2006)*



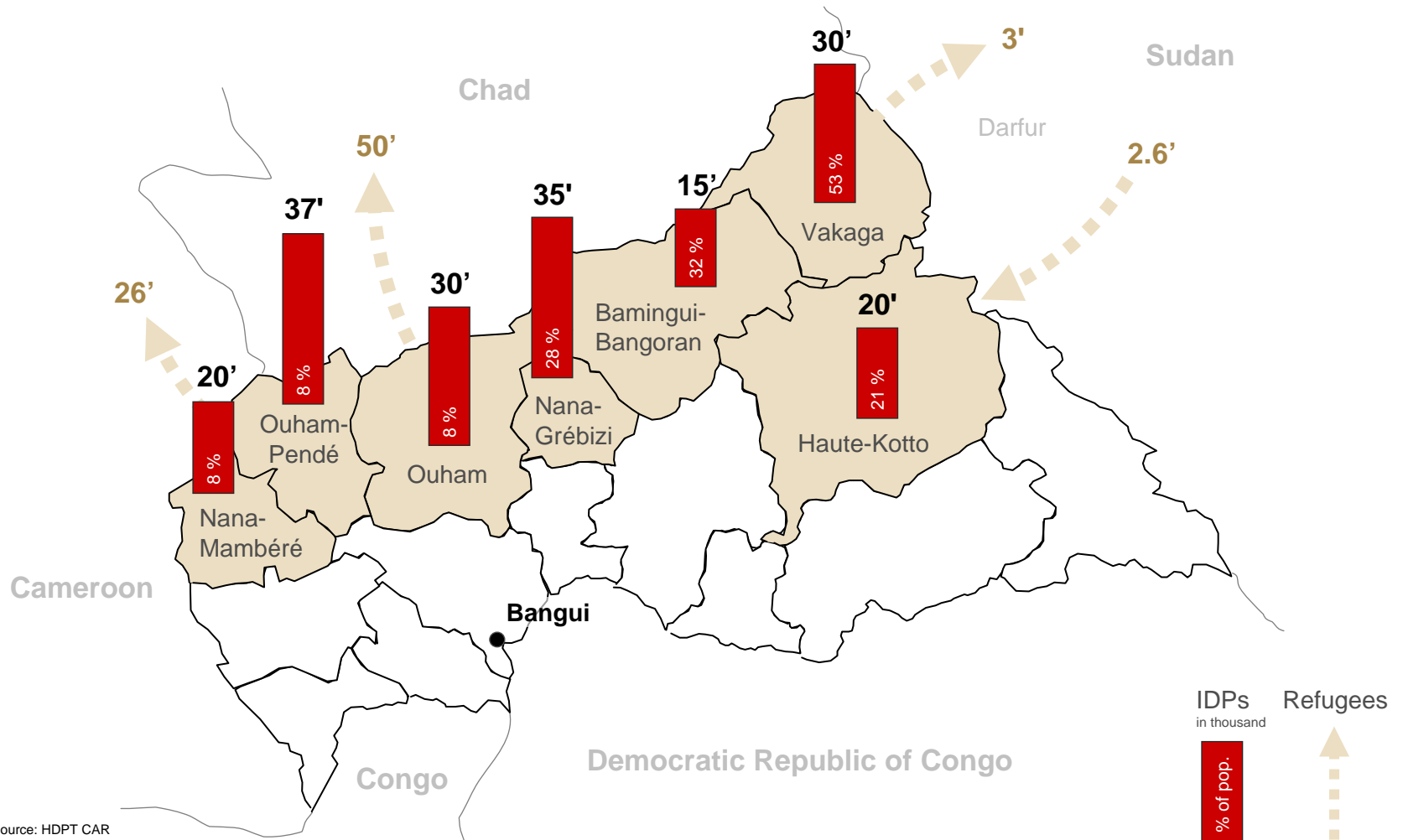

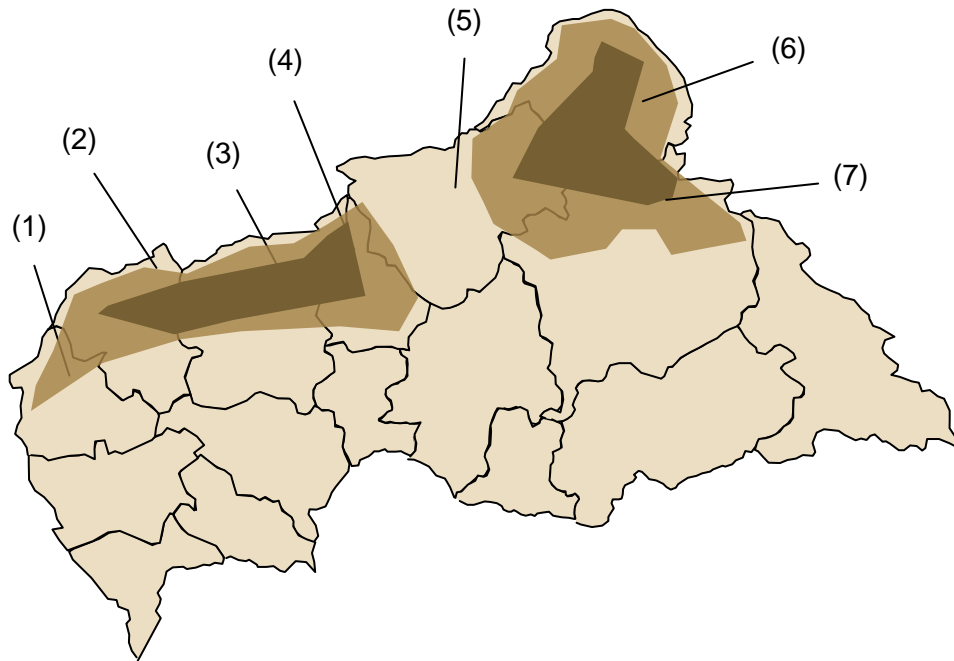

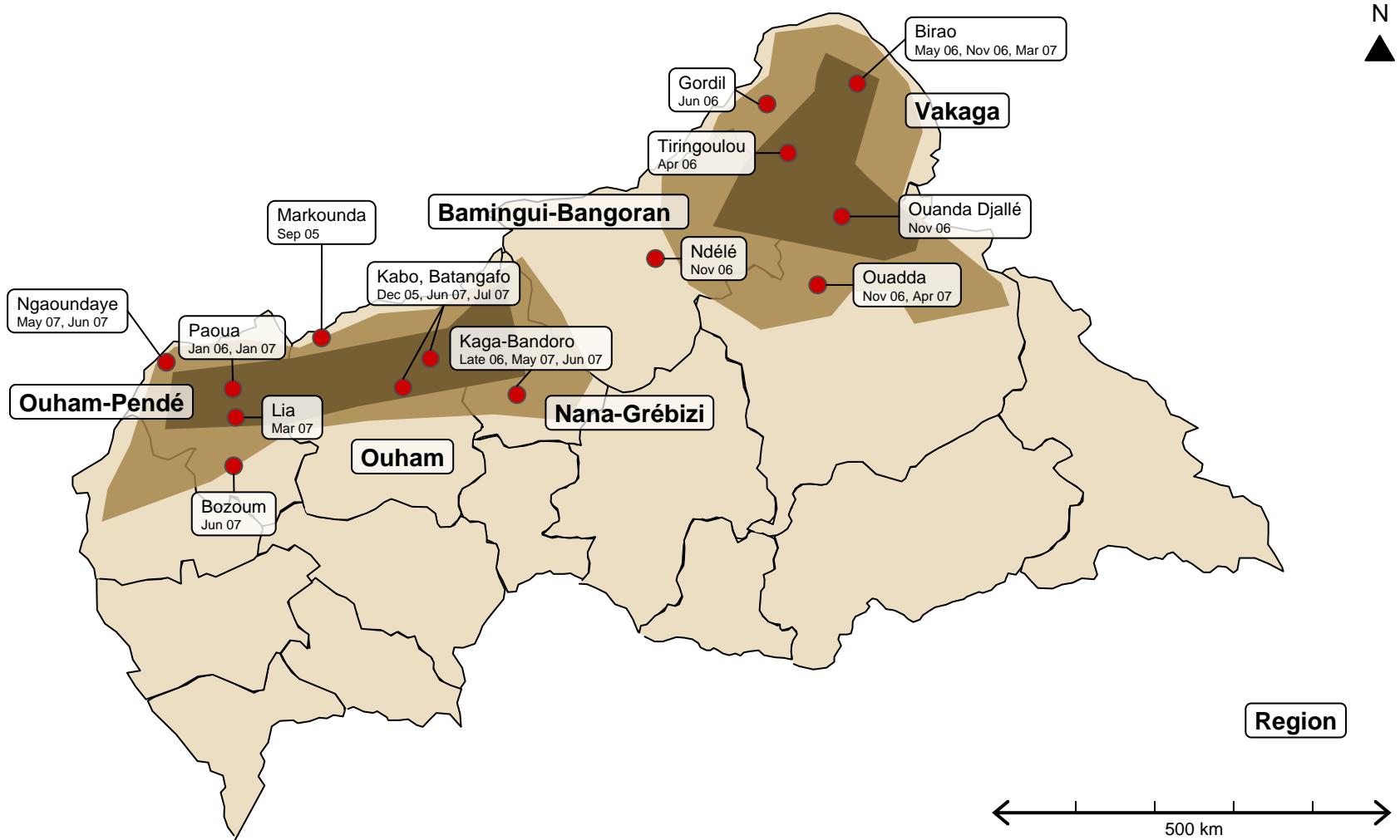

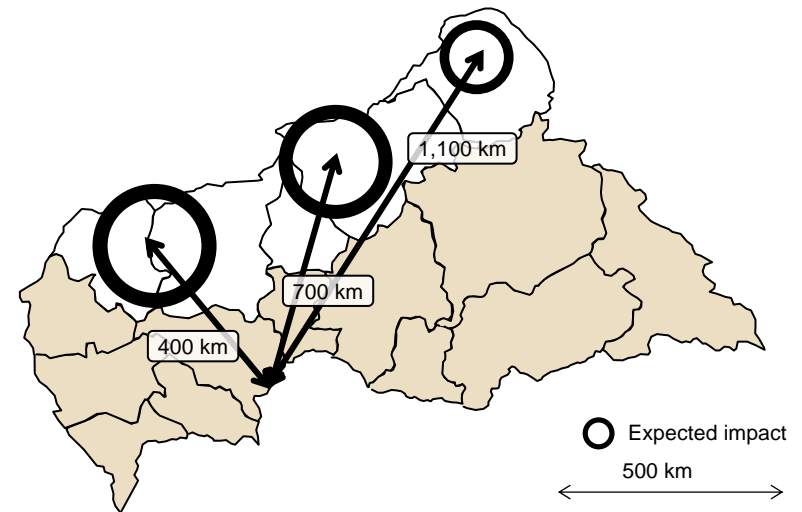


Establishing UN presence now vital

Fragile and long neglected areas

- Violent region, bordering Chad and Darfur area of Sudan
- North-eastern areas economically and politically cut-off, porous borders
- Recent assessment missions confirm fragility of the region and high level of need amongst those struck by violence
- Basic social services absent
- Vast distance from agency headquarters complicate provision of humanitarian support, coordination, data collection and sharing or development projects

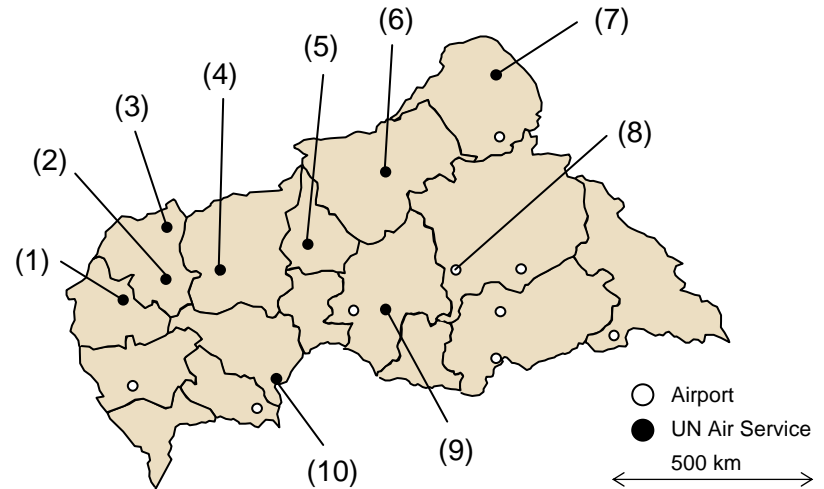


Improving logistics capacity to ensure supplies

Rainy season will impact on supply chain

- Logistics complicated by poor quality network of roads and bridges
- Northern areas very difficult to access during the rainy season
- Existing maps are dated and often no longer reflect situation on the ground
- Logistics info is innovatively shared among members of the HDPT

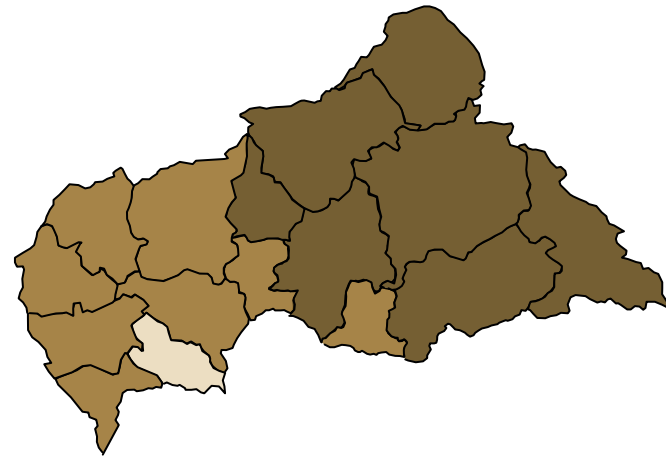

Finding a balance between security and access to beneficiaries

Improved access without armed escorts

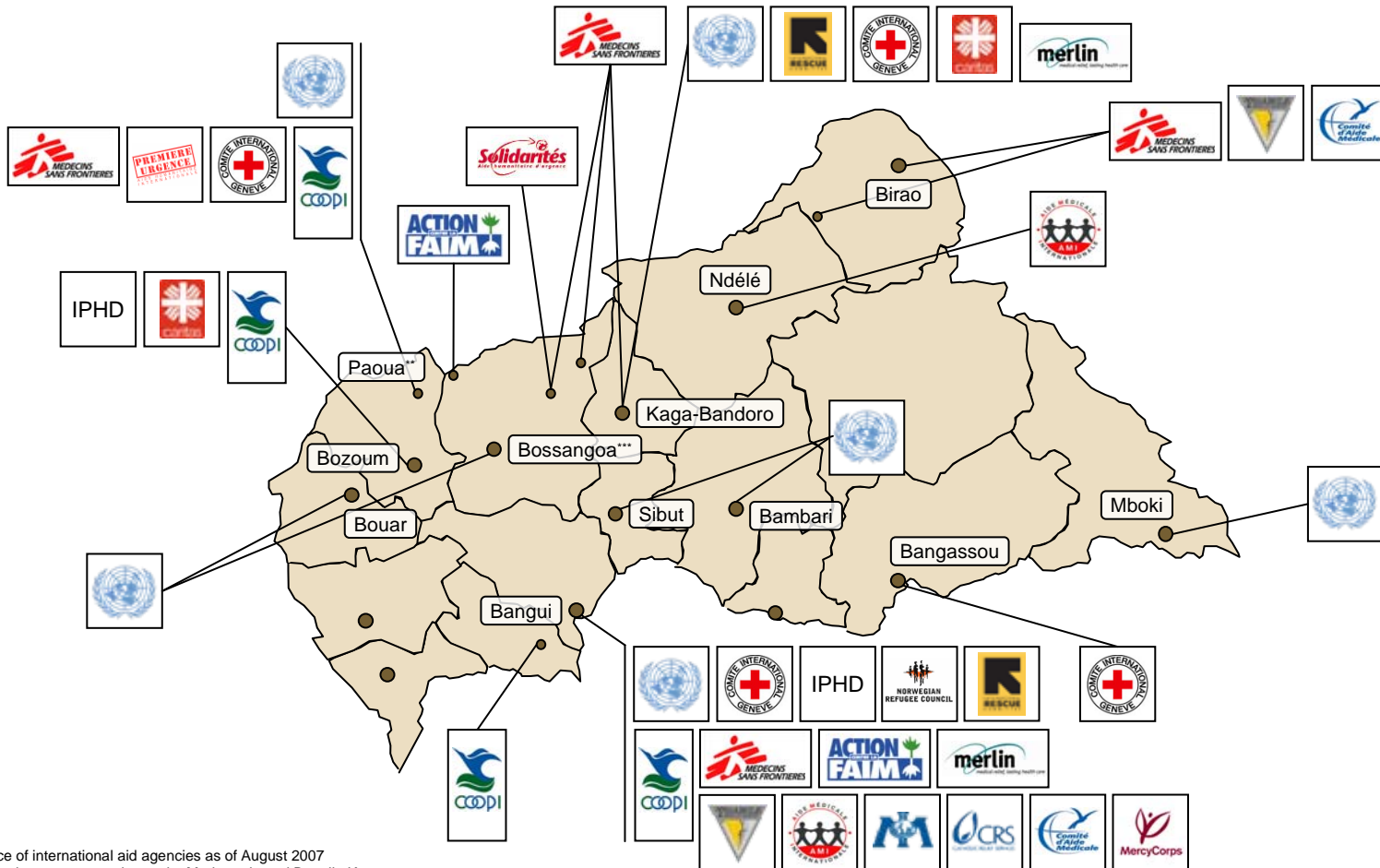
- Security environment steadily deteriorated in 2006
- Conflict in the north-west and north-east
- Proliferation of light weapons and criminality in urban centres a constant problem
- Despite fragile situation, it was necessary to stop use of armed escorts by UN in order to improve access to affected population

Coordination a challenge due to limited resources

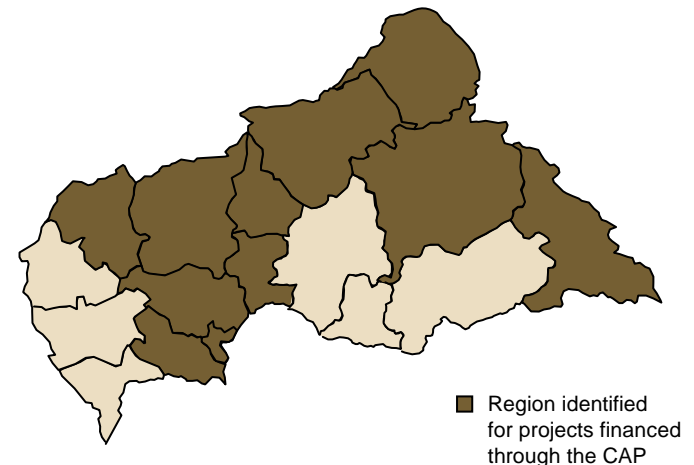
More staff and new agencies arriving

- Many aid and development agencies are still seriously understaffed
- Vast distances and limited resources complicate data collection and sharing
- Coordination structures currently being rebuilt while new agencies are arriving

Security, stability and development are interlinked

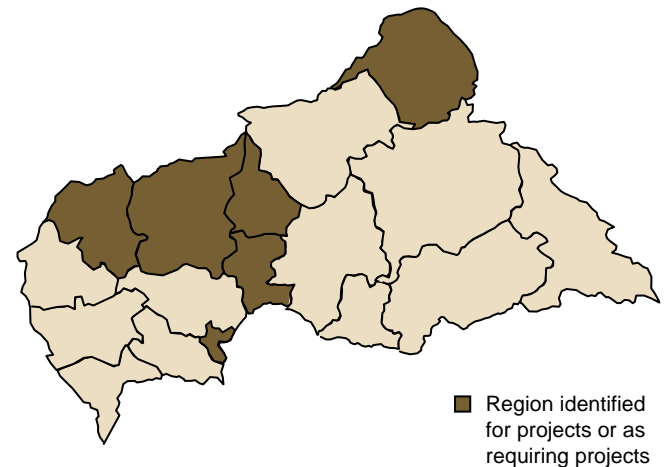
Signs of progress, but from a very low base

- GDP per capita declined from USD 374 in 1995 to USD 352 in 2006 and over 70 % of population live under monetary poverty rate
- Landlocked country with poor road network
- Poor governance and inefficient administration
- Economy starts growing again (GDP +3.2 %, 2006)

- Involve communities in recovery efforts
- Increase access to micro-finance services
- Strengthen capacity of economic institutions
- Promote early warning and crisis prevention

Insecurity impacts on schooling activities in the north

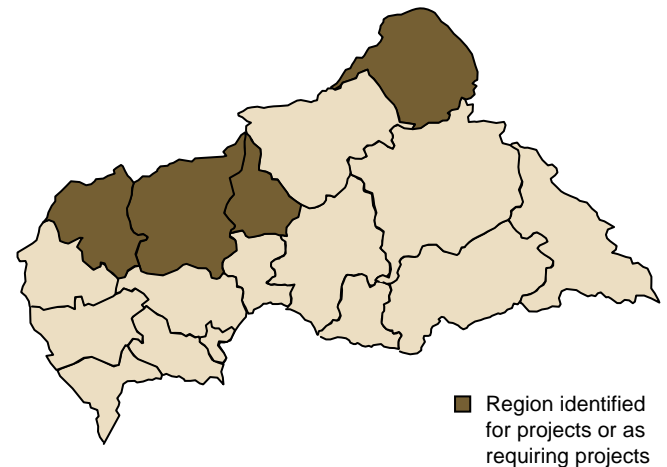
Restart of education efforts required in 2007

- Roughly one third of school buildings in conflict areas destroyed
- 292,500 school-aged children in the north are cut-off from basic social services, including education
- Rehabilitation and re-equipment of classrooms a major challenge

Selected agency objectives in 2007

- Help government reorganise education activities
- Roll-out a back-to-school campaign for all school-aged children to fight low school attendance rates
- Implement training programmes for teenage girls in the north

Food security remains a priority

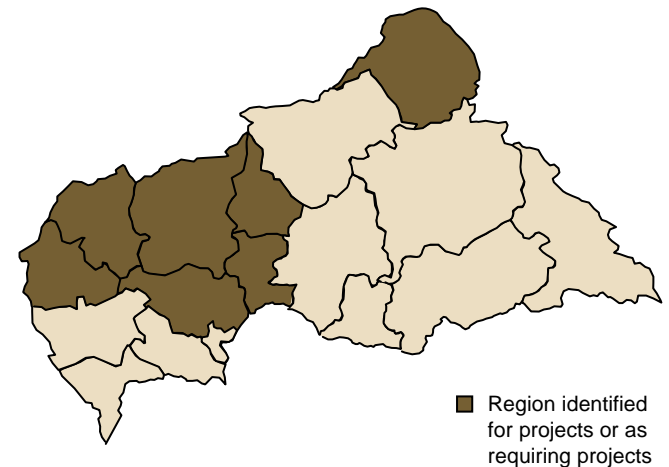
Insecurity leads to loss of agricultural assets

- Insecurity discourages agricultural production and leads to a dramatic decrease in output
- About 60 % of livestock owners fled to neighbouring countries
- Global acute malnutrition at 13 % and global chronic malnutrition at 35 % for children < 5 yrs

- Ensuring food access of vulnerable groups, especially in the north-west
- Restoring the country's agricultural production
- Strengthening food security coordination, data collection and dissemination of information

Improving public health quickly is vital

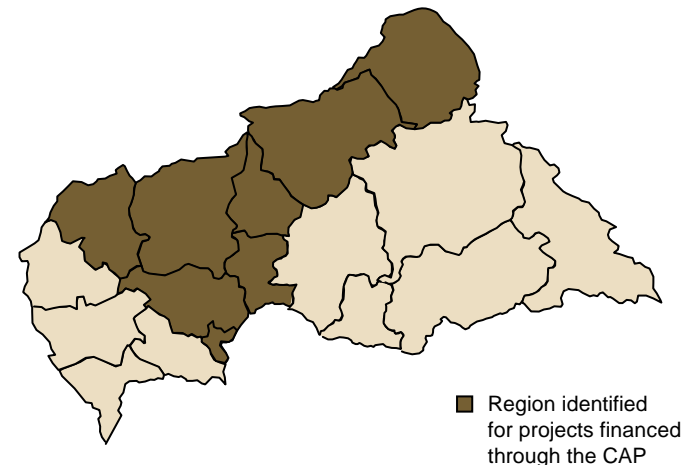
Insecurity further decreased response capacity

- Many public health structures destroyed
- Life expectancy likely to drop to 41 years in 2007
- Maternal mortality rate one of the highest in Africa
- Almost 1 in 5 children do not reach age of 5
- HIV prevalence among 15-49 year olds at 6.2 %

Selected agency objectives in 2007

- Improve basic health services in conflict zones
- Improve health status of children under five and pregnant women
- Step up fight against STIs, HIV/AIDS and Tuberculosis, especially in conflict afflicted areas

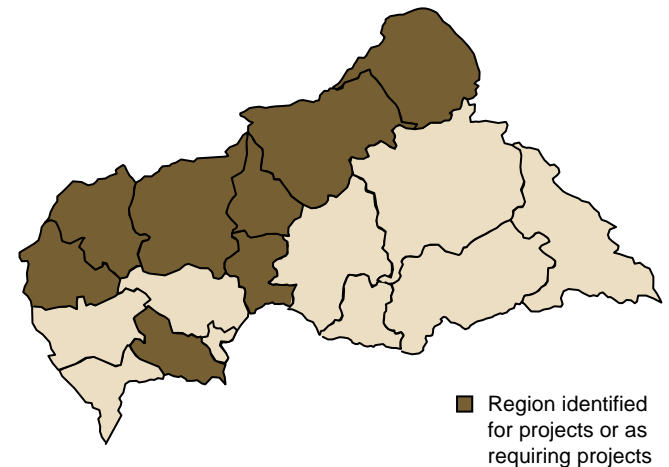
Internal displacement in 2007

- Internal displacement increased during last quarter of 2006, especially in Nana-Gribizi and Vakaga
- Burning and looting of villages a growing concern in the north-west and north-east
- Gender-based violence spreading
- Humanitarian monitoring network being built

- Provide protection to IDPs and vulnerable groups
- Increase direct access to communities and revive traditional conflict resolution mechanisms
- Train armed forces on int. humanitarian law

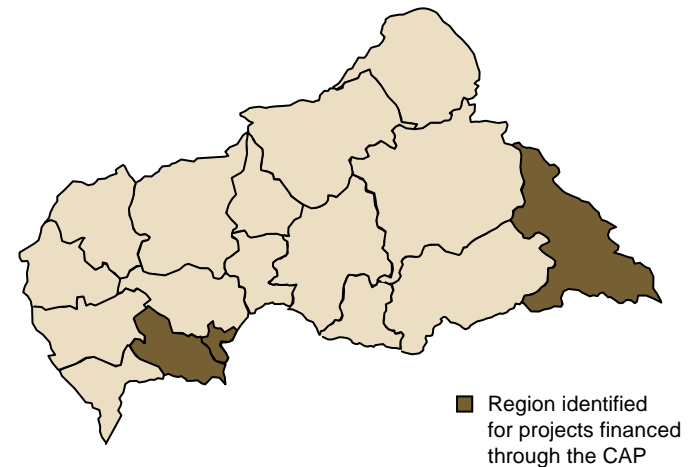
Refugees from DRC, Sudan and other countries

- Voluntary repatriation of refugees envisaged
- Fragile border situation and instability in neighbouring DRC, Chad, Sudan make influx of more refugees nevertheless a possibility

Shelter needed when villages are burnt

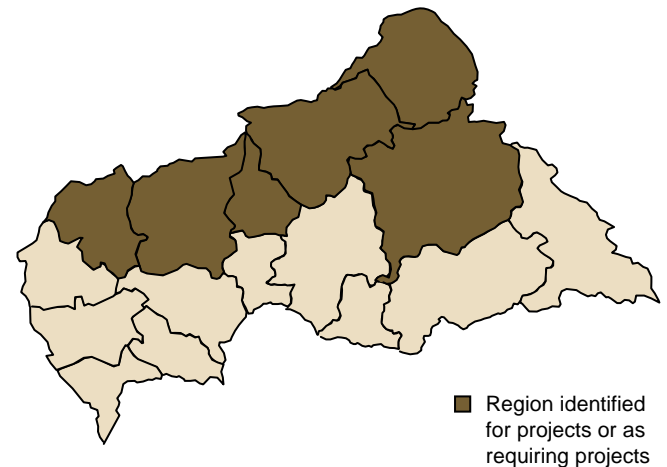
Housing and displacement are linked

- Villagers who had to leave their homes because of insecurity (including looting, burning, destruction) are left without shelter
- Non-food items (NFI) and shelter will become increasingly important as displacement situation worsens

- Deliver NFI-Kits to at least 10,000 families
- Stockpile and preposition NFI in anticipation of violence
- Ensure coordination of sector activities

Two million people without access to safe water

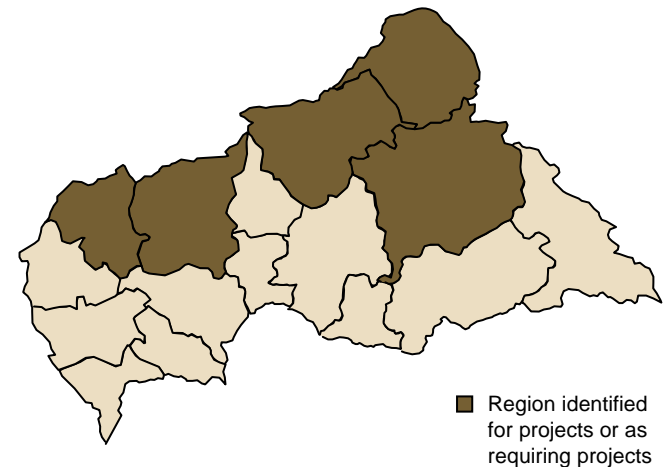
Very poor sanitary conditions

- More than 36 % of households do not have access to safe drinking water
- No routine water quality monitoring system in place
- More than 47 % of the population do not have sanitary facilities of any kind

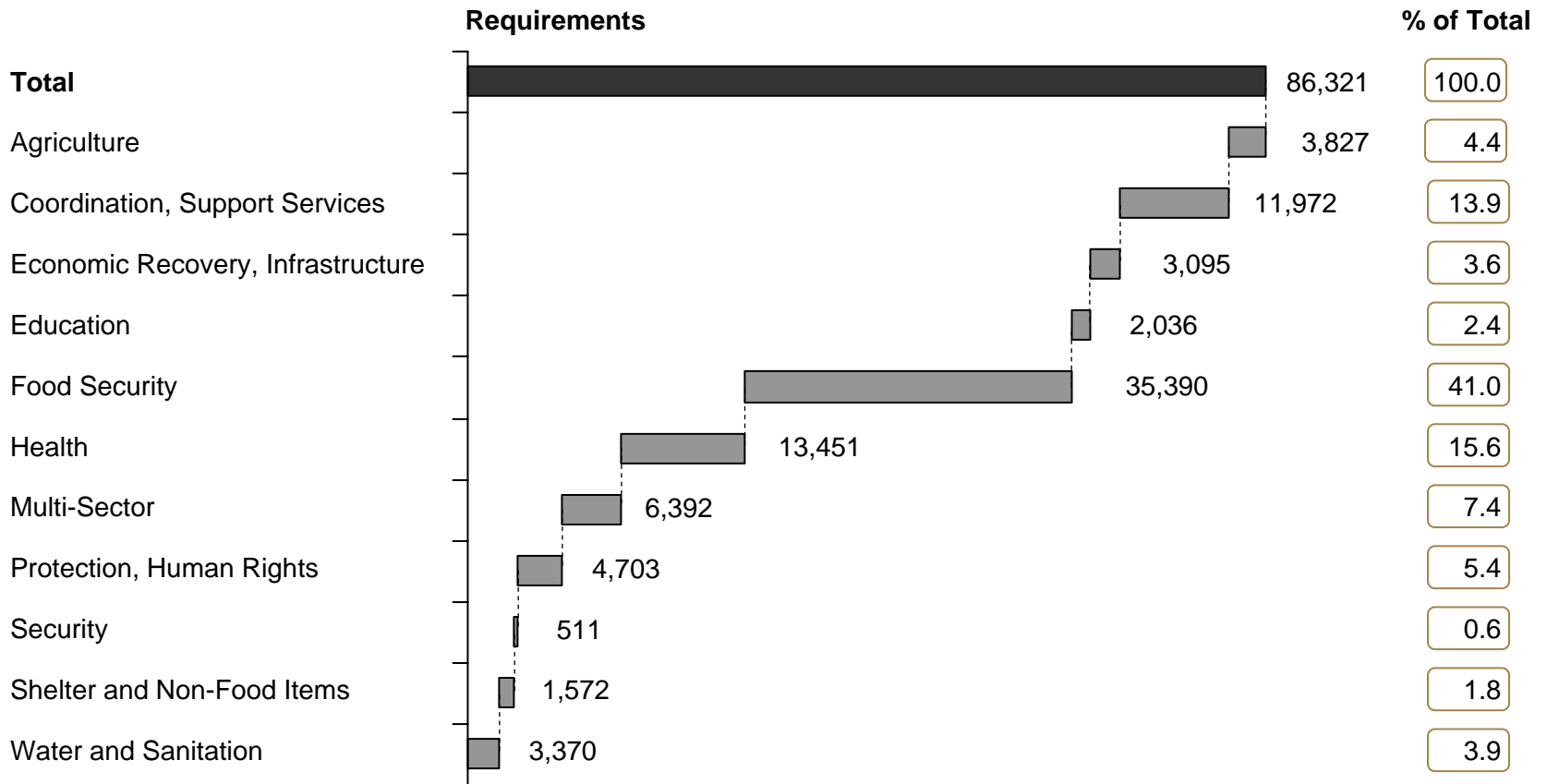
